A New Voice in Latin American Literature

Cuban-born author Jorge Armenteros takes us into the unexplored rooms of the human mind in his debut novel

The Book of I by Jorge Armenteros


The Book of I is the story of Teaston, a painter struggling with schizophrenia, who finds himself at the edge of a cliff, at the edge of his life. Set in the seaside village of Cassis, in the south of France, the novel explores our fragmented human nature through the distorted lens that Teaston provides.

The novel is written by Cuban-born author Jorge Armenteros, a Harvard grad, who during his twenty-year career as a psychiatrist has gained a profound knowledge of the workings of the mind. In *The Book of I*, Armenteros offers a deep meditation on the confines of human nature, intimately revealing the mind of Teaston, a person who struggles to understand what is real, what is unreal, and what defines self-identity.

Readers will find the narrative influenced by the formal spontaneity of Cortázar's *Hopscotch*, the shifting levels of reality of Kafka's *The Trial*, the iconoclastic characterization of Bolaño's *The Savage Detectives*, and the interiority and lyricism of Rilke's *The Notebooks of Malte Laurids Brigge*. A proponent of experimental literary fiction, Armenteros says, "I have a high esteem for my readers so I invite them to the creative party. Easy prose is akin to baby food. It is time to take the spoon out of the reader's mouth."

Armenteros completed *The Book of I* while attending the MFA program at Lesley University. He splits his time between his private psychiatry practice in Florida and his home in Georgia and wrote much of the novel from 30,000 feet, flying between cities. He says, "I write like a jaguar, to the neck, all at once. I find those moments in the plane, all the way up in thin air, to be exceptional moments for writing. Without terrestrial interruptions, I let the mind loose."

The novel is published by Jaded Ibis Press in Seattle, an avant-garde publisher who produces multi-dimensional collaborations between authors and artists. Both the color and the black-and-white editions of *The Book of I* contain original images by international artist and architect Liselott Johnsson. The book is also accompanied by an original full-album soundtrack by Sarah Wallin Huff, a violinist and composer who performs as Concertmaster of the Southern California Philharmonic.

Who wrote it?


Jorge Armenteros (www.jorgearmenteros.net) was born in 1961 in Havana, Cuba, two years after the revolution led by Fidel Castro. He and his family became political refugees in Madrid, before finally settling in San Juan, Puerto Rico. He was the first student in his high school to be accepted to Harvard University, even when he only had rudimentary knowledge of English. There, he took several electives in Spanish and Latin American Literature from notable scholars, like Juan Marichal, while completing his biomedical engineering degree. After graduating cum laude, he went back to San Juan to study medicine at The University of Puerto Rico.

In addition to his medical training, he completed an MA in Spanish and Latin American Literature from New York University, and an MFA in Creative Writing from Lesley University. He has written three novels since the start of the MFA program. *The Book of I* is his first novel. The next two, *The Civet* and *The Roar of the River*, are ready to be presented to agents/publishers.

A practicing psychiatrist, Armenteros now divides his time between Georgia, Florida, and the south of France. And when there is a free minute in the day, he practices the violin. Coincidentally, the violin is the subject of his fourth novel now in progress.
